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# Message from the Detachment Commander

“The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) continues to have a clear path forward with the implementation of the 2023-2025 Strategic Plan. As an extension of, and building upon, the 2020-2022 Strategic Plan, we remain focused on and committed to our three strategic priorities, specifically our people, our work, and our communities. The plan will continue to guide our organization’s priorities, strategies, initiatives, and the requirements expected with the enactment of the regulations associated to the new Community Safety and Policing Act (CSPA),” OPP Commissioner Thomas Carrique.



I am pleased to present our new 2023 – 2025 Detachment Action Plan. The Orillia OPP Detachment is located at 1 University Avenue in the City of Orillia. This brand new 33,000 square foot state of the art facility is the largest stand-alone detachment in the OPP and hosts over 160 staff members. It is strategically positioned to allow quick access to the City of Orillia, and the Townships of Oro-Medonte, Ramara and Severn.

The Orillia OPP Detachment staff are all aligned with the OPP Values and they:

- Serve with Pride, Professionalism and Honour;
- Interact with Respect, Compassion and Fairness;
- Lead with Integrity, Honesty and Courage.

The Orillia Detachment continues to demonstrate a commitment to public safety through collaboration, investigative excellence and visibility. The Orillia OPP has partnered with many agencies in all of our jurisdictions and works towards implementing innovative ideas to assist in traffic calming and reduction in criminal activity and victimization. The Orillia OPP Detachment utilizes technology and statistical data from calls for service, which is analyzed to maximize our visibility in the communities.

The Orillia OPP Detachment continues to partner with the Simcoe Muskoka Canadian Mental Health Association and has implemented a seven day a week Mobile Crisis Response Team (MCRT) along with a five day a week Crisis Outreach and Support Team (COAST). The Community Mobilization Unit at Orillia Detachment continues to support our communities by addressing ongoing challenges through environmental scans and community engagement. The Community Mobilization Unit is regularly at community events, on our trails and conducting foot patrol.

The Orillia OPP also has a highly trained and experienced Crime Unit which investigates all major crimes in our jurisdictions. Within the Crime Unit is the Sexual Violence Unit (SVU) which investigates the majority of sexual assault investigations. The SVU has continued to build partnerships with numerous support agencies in our jurisdictions to ensure victims of crime are fully supported. The Orillia OPP Detachment Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) works in conjunction with our Crime Unit and front line members to conduct investigations involving trafficking of illegal substances and multi-jurisdictional property crimes. Within the CSCU team is our Offender Management and Apprehension Program (OMAP). OMAP monitors bail and release compliance of violent offenders along with locating and returning to justice wanted persons.

The Orillia OPP Court Case Management (CCM) Unit manages all provincial and criminal cases through our two courthouse locations. The CCM Unit also provides security at these locations. The Orillia OPP administrative team supports this very busy detachment that handles over 2000 phone calls each month along with over 900 walk-ins to our front doors.

The Orillia OPP Detachment members have continued to increase their visibility in our communities through foot patrols, focused patrols and proactive community involvement activities. These positive engagements with our communities help break down barriers and provide opportunities to be approached by community members to discuss challenges in our communities, along with deterring criminal activity and the reduction of motor vehicle infractions and collisions through visibility.

Moving into 2023-2025 the Orillia OPP will continue to commit to focusing on:

- Reduction of drugs, violent and property crime
- Reduction in traffic collisions through enforcement of our “Big Four”
- Enforcement of unnecessary vehicular noise
- Community Mobilization - foot patrol, prevention programs
- Communication enhancements

The continued support from our communities, along with the education, awareness and the dedication of our members will be instrumental in keeping our communities safe and secure through 2023-2025.

## Our Detachment

The Orillia Detachment is located in Simcoe County and incorporates the City of Orillia and the Townships of Oro-Medonte, Ramara and Severn. These are vibrant communities, hosting numerous tourists year-round. The detachment area encompasses Highways 11, 12 and 400; the major transportation links between Ontario's cottage country and Southern Ontario. Patrol and enforcement also occur on the motorized snow vehicle trails and waterways, such as Lakes Couchiching and Simcoe, and parts of the Trent Severn Waterway. Additionally, the Lake Simcoe Regional Airport serves as an integral part of the area's transportation infrastructure. The detachment area also encompasses Mara, McRae, and Bass Lake Provincial Parks making it a popular location for day use and overnight camping.

The senior population residing within the Orillia detachment area is expected to increase. Programs such as Seniors and Law Enforcement Together (SALT) continue to grow in our community. The local group of highly active volunteers work with our Adult Volunteer program and other volunteer programs in the community to assist police identifying and meeting the needs of seniors.

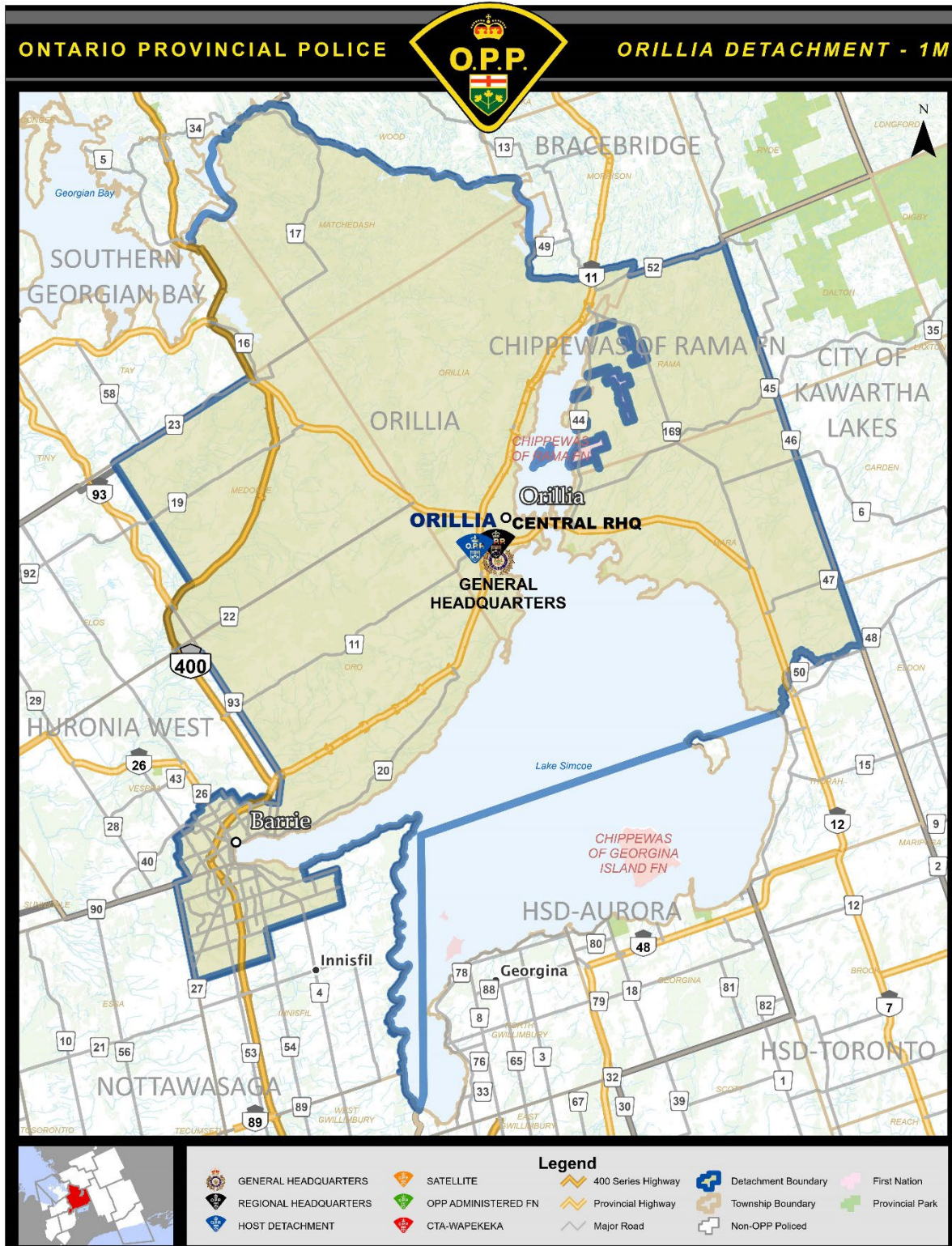
Georgian College and Lakehead University contribute to a growing student population in the City of Orillia. Lakehead University continues to expand within the City of Orillia, where relationships between police and the University have become ever more important. The Orillia Detachment members have fostered strong relationships with community partners in the justice, health, social and educational sectors. These partnerships have afforded opportunity for collaboration in efforts to reduce victimization and enhance community safety. Orillia Detachment continues to partner with the Canadian Mental Health Association in the Crisis Outreach and Support Team (COAST) program. This program partners one of our detachment members with a mental health worker to respond to mental health calls and make proactive contact with members in our community suffering from mental illness.

Tourism continues to grow as a major economic industry in the area, including recreational activities and events such as:

- Cycling, boating and skiing
- Several kilometres of accessible trails for motorized snow vehicles (MSV) and all terrain vehicles (ATV)
- Outdoor adventure and cycling races
- Concerts and festivals

We continue to evolve based on the changing needs of our communities by leveraging analytics and technology in order to create efficient and effective policing within all our municipalities.

# Roadways, Waterways and Trails

**Description:** The Orillia OPP Detachment will focus on the education and enforcement of the “Big Four” (aggressive driving, lack of seatbelts, distracted driving and impaired driving) on our roadways and highways along with an increased presence on the water and trails. We will continue to utilize analytics and community feedback to develop meaningful focused patrols, provide education through interactions and media releases and conduct enforcement to effectively reduce the negative impacts on our roadways waterways and trails.

You now have the option to report select occurrences to police from the convenience of a computer.

Visit [www.opp.ca/reporting](http://www.opp.ca/reporting) to use the Citizen Self Reporting system. Specific incidents can be reported online at your convenience without attending a detachment or waiting for an officer.

You can use this system to report:

- Driving Complaints
- Lost/missing property
- Mischief/damage to property
- Mischief/damage to vehicle
- Stolen licence plate(s) and/or validation sticker
- Theft From vehicle
- Theft

**Do not use this system if this is an emergency! If it is, call 9-1-1.**

**9-1-1 is for police, fire, or medical emergencies only.**

Every time an accidental or hang-up 9-1-1 call is received, OPP officers are dispatched.

You may be taking police officers away from a real emergency.

**#KnowWhenToCall**

If you've dialed in error, stay on the line and speak with the communicator. This will eliminate the need for the emergency operator to call back. As per OPP policy, officers will still be dispatched to ensure you are safe.
